UPCOMING CHANGES FOR NONCITIZEN MEMBER ELIGIBILITY

Beginning October 1, 2026, certain noncitizen adults will no longer be eligible for Wisconsin Medicaid due to Section 71109 of the federal One Big Beautiful Bill Act. Federal changes limit adult eligibility for health care to U.S. citizens, U.S. nationals, lawful permanent residents, Cuban and Haitian entrants, and Compact of Free Association citizens. Adult applicants and existing members with newly nonqualifying immigration statuses will not have access to health care coverage through Wisconsin Medicaid.

Providers should always verify a member's eligibility before delivering services to avoid denied claims.

Newly Nonqualifying Immigration Statuses

Starting October 1, 2026, noncitizen adults age 19 and older with one of these legal immigration statuses are no longer eligible for Wisconsin Medicaid:

- Amerasian
- Asylee

- Conditional entrant
- Foreign-born member of a Tribal nation
- Person granted withholding of removal
- Person paroled for at least one year
- Refugee or special immigrant
- Trafficking victim or their family
- Violence Against Women Act self-petitioner

The new noncitizen eligibility criteria apply to:

- New Wisconsin Medicaid applications on and after October 1, 2026.
- Current Wisconsin Medicaid members as of October 1, 2026.

Exceptions

Certain individuals will remain eligible for Wisconsin Medicaid, even if they have a newly nonqualifying immigration status listed previously. Those individuals are:

- Lawfully present children younger than 19 years old.
- Lawfully present pregnant people.
- Lawfully present young adults under 21 years old who live in an Institution for Mental Diseases.

Nonimpacted Immigration Statuses

Noncitizen adults age 19 and older with one of these statuses remain eligible for Wisconsin Medicaid:

- Lawful permanent resident
- Compact of Free Association migrant
- Cuban-Haitian entrant

Backdated Eligibility

Adult noncitizens with newly nonqualifying immigration statuses may apply for backdated coverage for the months preceding October 2026. Refer to the ForwardHealth Online Handbook Retroactive Enrollment topic [#280](#) for more information on backdated coverage.

For example: Mira, a 25-year-old refugee, applies for Wisconsin Medicaid on November 15, 2026. She meets all eligibility criteria for a Wisconsin Medicaid program, BadgerCare Plus, except she does not have a qualifying immigration status. Mira requests retroactive coverage for the past months of August, September, and October. Due to her refugee status, she is not eligible

REMINDER

for BadgerCare Plus starting October 1, but she is eligible for August and September.

BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Program

There is no change to eligibility for the BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Program. Refer to the BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Program topic [#785](#) for more information.

Emergency Services

There is no change to eligibility for emergency services as defined by Wis. Admin. Code § [DHS 101.03\(52\)](#). Noncitizens who no longer qualify for Wisconsin Medicaid can apply for emergency services if they have a medical emergency. Assisting Members

Helping members navigate these eligibility changes is vital to maintaining health care access. Providers are asked to remind Medicaid members to tell their local agency if their immigration status changes, particularly if they become a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident or if they are pregnant. Supplemental Security Income (SSI) beneficiaries also need to report changes in their immigration status to their local Social Security office.

To help members who receive SSI, are pregnant, or recently became a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident maintain their coverage, providers should encourage members to report these changes immediately to both:

- The Social Security Administration
- The agency administering their Medicaid eligibility

Documentation Retention

As a reminder, providers must follow the documentation retention requirements per Wis. Admin. Code § [DHS 106.02\(9\)](#). Providers are required to produce or submit documentation, or both, to DHS upon request. Per Wis. Stat. § [49.45\(3\)\(f\)](#), providers of services shall maintain records as required by DHS for verification of provider claims for reimbursement. DHS may audit such records to verify the actual provision of services and the appropriateness and accuracy of claims. DHS may deny or recoup payment for services that fail to meet these requirements. Refusal to produce documentation may result in denial of submitted claims, recoupment of paid claims, application of intermediate sanctions, or termination from the Medicaid program.
